The Board of Directors meeting was held on March 20, 2019.

What a busy month it has been as our fiscal year draws to a close in March. We had a successful fundraiser; hosted students from the University of Georgia; planned and held our annual meeting; elected new board members officers and nominating committee members; passed our budget; supported adoption of the 8th principle; prepared an annual report; and many other activities.

The March Board meeting focused on the planning for the board retreat which we will hold on April 6. The purpose of the retreat is for the new and current board members to better know each other, review lessons learned from the past year, and to plan or establish priorities for the coming year.

The board reviewed and

approved the Share-the-Plate organizations for the coming year. They were recommended by the Social Action and Outreach Teams. The organizations are: Community Forum Foundation, Dunbar, recommended by the Climate Action Team: Holidays without Hunger, recommended by the Hunger Team; Showing Up For Racial Justice, selected by the Racial Justice Team; Lee County Homeless Coalition, selected by the Heart for the Homeless Team; and Operation Joy, a consensus choice of the board and an effort which is strongly supported by the congregation.

We also reviewed activities for the Annual Meeting, discussed the annual financial review to be held after the close of the year, and discussed some committee activities. Board members will be completing a review of a

Congregational Manual that compiles guidelines and procedures of our congregation.

The dinner and auction fundraiser held March 9 was successful in raising enough money to offset most of the existing deficit we had between income and expenses for the past year. Attendees enjoyed a delicious Italian dinner and had fun during the silent and live auctions. During the coming months, the winning bidders will be enjoying dinners with fellow congregants or friends, plays, art works, boat rides, and many other prizes. Thank you, Kendra and your team, for making this a successful event. Everyone needs to think of new offerings for next year's big event to make this an even greater FUNraiser.

Don't forget to pass on your suggestions, issues or

concerns, or recommendations for improvements to the Board of Directors so we can better serve everyone in our congregation.

Highlights of the March 24, 2019 Annual Meeting All Faiths Unitarian Congregation

The budget, as highlighted in the 2019 Annual Report, was approved.

Outgoing Board members, Jeanne Ezell and Lisa Leonhardt, were recognized for the dedicated service to All Faiths.

A motion for All Faiths to support the adoption of an 8th Principle by the General Assembly at the UUA Annual Meeting in June was unanimously approved. The 8th Principle reads as follows: "We, the member congregations of the Unitarian-Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse, multi-cultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

Rev. McGregor honored the memory of those members who passed away since the last annual meeting: Bill Benyak, Barb Pizzini, Doug Jeranson, and Matt Stark.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Joan Marshall, on behalf of the Climate Action Team, raised the Planet Earth flag on our flagpole out front as a symbol of our commitment to protect our environment and the planet.

WHAT'S ON THE TABLE AT THE NEHEMIAH ACTION?

LIFE conducted meetings with Mayor Henderson of Fort Myers, City Planning Department, City Housing and Real Estate Department, Center for Community Change, Florida Housing Coalition, Lee County Property Appraiser, Housing Finance Authority, Shimberg Center for Affordable Housing.

Problem: Fort Myers does not have enough affordable rental units. Affordable housing is a crisis in Lee County. 45% of households are paying over the federally recommended 30% of income on housing. In Fort Myers, 3,000 of our poorest families are paying over half of their income on rent. It takes the average renter 82 hours a week at a minimum wage job to afford the average one bedroom/one bathroom apartment. Over half of Lee Memorial's entry-level employees cannot afford to live within half an hour of the hospital. Even the City of Fort Myers employees are commuting from Lehigh and Estero because the median rent in Fort Myers is close to \$1,200 a month for a one-bedroom apartment. The housing crisis is impacting the school district and their ability to attract teachers to the area. The data we have collected shows that the housing crisis is getting worse each year.

Solution: LIFE will be asking Mayor Henderson to draft an affordable housing trust fund ordinance. A trust fund is a mechanism for cities, counties, or states to set aside money for the specific use of affordable housing. While the state of Florida has an affordable housing trust fund called the Sadowski Trust Fund, the funds have instead been used to support the general state budget and have not been used for housing. While the state has agreed to reallocate the funds as they were initially intended, Fort Myers will see roughly \$1 million in 2020 for affordable housing because of it. However, the City of Fort Myers had a city level affordable housing trust fund created in 2008. The fund was initially funded with close to a million dollars and then was not funded again. Over 250 cities and 1,000 counties across the country have Affordable Housing Trust Funds. Because they are each written specifically for and by the city or county who adopt the ordinance, some are more effective than others. LIFE will be asking to recreate and fund an affordable housing trust fund with the express intent to increase the stock of affordable rentals in the city of Fort Myers.

CLIMATE ACTION TEAM NEWS

March has been a busy month for your Climate Action Team. Many thanks to the ninety (90) congregants who signed our thank you letters to Representative Francis Rooney and Washington State Governor Jay Inslee for their environmental leadership.

March 11th and 12th were the Unitarian Universalist Justice Florida (UUJF) Legislative Days in Tallahassee and the lobbying emphasis this year was on environmental justice. Joan Marshall accompanied to the Capitol our partners in the Dunbar community with whom we have been working for the past two years: Crystal Johnson who leads the Community Forum Foundation and her 15 year old daughter, Imoni and the Reverend Thelma Black-Smith. We met with Representative Rodriguez and a staff member for Senator Benacquisto to discuss the need for better hurricane preparedness in the Dunbar community and other environmental issues affecting them. Crystal also participated in panel presentations to the press on both March 12th and 13th about environmental problems affecting low-income communities around the state.

At our annual meeting on March 24th we gathered outside to officially raise our new Earth flag in order to publicly make evident our dedication to the UU 7th Principle: "Respect for the interdependent web of existence of which we are a part." This is part of our plan to become more visible and vocal in our efforts to promote environmental sustainability and to halt and reverse the impacts of climate change on our planet. We encourage all of you to speak out to your friends and neighbors about the need to act now in order to mitigate the worst aspects of environmental abuse and global warming on our lives both now and in the future.

During the school Spring Break here in Lee County, we launched the initial training for the Resilience Volunteer Youth Corps program we are helping to organize in Dunbar in collaboration with our sister congregation, UUCFM, and the Community Forum Foundation. This will be an ongoing program for 8th to 12th grade students to help them prepare to deal with future emergencies in their communities. We are also engaged in an online fund-raising campaign as part of an effort to secure a grant from a USA Today program called "a community thrives." These funds will be used to be able to offer scholarships to Youth Corps participants. Please support these efforts by contributing to the fund between now and April 18th on the All Faiths Facebook page.

Our services on April 14th will be dedicated to a celebration of Earth Day. CAT will once again sponsor a "Bring One – Buy One" plant sale to raise funds for our activities. The Garden Committee will join us this year with a plant sale of offshoots of our thriving All Faiths garden plants so they can raise funds for their efforts as well. Plan now to participate in this special event and show your support for the work of your fellow congregants.

Our next CAT meeting will be on Tuesday, April 2nd at 1:30 p.m. Come join us and help plan our future events and activities. We all need to become actively engaged in finding ways to help preserve life on our planet. Time is getting short for us to be able to have a meaningful impact on the damage being done by climate change. Together we can make a difference.

TOGETHER ON THE JOURNEY

Janet and Gerald Goen Members Since October 2018



All Faiths welcomed Gerald and Janet Goen into membership in October 2018. Retiree residents of Tarpon Springs since 1994, the Goens relocated to Fort Myers last year to be near their daughter, Jennifer, who is Director of Government Affairs

and Chief Lobbyist at Florida Gulf Coast University.

Born, raised and educated in Indiana, Janet and Gerald were high school sweethearts. Their family backgrounds are similar; mothers were homemakers and fathers, skilled craftsmen. One of five children, Janet's twin sister and older brother are still living. Gerald's only sibling, a sister, died at age 14. They described their families' religious affiliations in the Methodist and United Brethren churches as "sort of Easter and Christmas attenders."

Married for 64 years, the Goens have two daughters, two grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren. Gerald says he was smitten with Janet when he was a freshman and Janet a sixth grader in their small township (Selma) school system.

Janet studied fashion design and taught adult beginning and advanced tailoring. She won an Indiana State Fair grand championship award for her clothing design and dress making. After two years of study at Purdue University, Gerald earned his bachelor's, master's and guidance certificate from Ball State University. He taught junior and high school history/government, became head basket/baseball and assistant football coach and guidance counselor.

Gerald left the classroom in 1972 to work as union rep for the Indiana State Teachers Association and the National Education Association. He was a trained as a collective bargainer, lobbyist, and arbitrated unfair labor practices, dismissal hearings, and multiple mediations. Gerald managed one strike. One of his proudest accomplishments was passage of collective bargaining in 1973. Gerald recalls among policies they overturned was the requirement that pregnant teachers resign once their pregnancies reached seven months gestation.

Janet's career took an early political turn in 1984 when she became the first woman elected Clerk of the Circuit Court in Dekalb County, Indiana. In a county that polled 60-40% against her, she won by 47 votes. She won reelection by almost 1,400 votes. During her tenure she brought the first generation of touch screen voting machines to the county.

One of Janet's many duties was performing marriages. She recalled one strange but impressive home ceremony with the traditional trellis and bales of straw for seats. The bride was adorned in white leather and attendants were splendid in black leather vests and shorts. The men wore black leather pants and Harley tee shirts. The wedding party strolled down an aisle made up of parked motor cycles.

In 1992 Janet narrowly lost a bid for the Indiana House of Representatives in a district that had been controlled by Republicans for over 50 years. The Goens describe themselves as "card-carrying Kennedy, Clinton, Obama and Bill Nelson Democrats. In Florida Janet has been a multi term Pinellas County State Committee Woman to the Florida Democratic Party and was twice elected President of the Democratic Women's Club of Florida where she remains on the board. A highlight of her political career was serving as Electoral College Elector for the Obama/Biden 2008 election. She and Gerald have met Barak Obama three times and had the honor of attending his first inauguration and inaugural ball.

In Florida Gerald served over 13 years as President of Greater Tarpon Springs Democratic Club. He was appointed in 2011 as a founding member of Tarpon Springs Budget Advisory Committee, a group that brought solar power to the city. He twice served as president of the Tarpon Springs Home Owners Association.

In 2007 the Goens found their way to Unitarian Universalism through Democrat friends. They loved the atmosphere, and their minister Wes Stephens' sermons. Gerald

is a founding member of the UU Legislative Committee of Florida, now UU Justice Florida. Janet is a founding member of the UU Tarpon Springs Quilters Club and would love to see a quilters group form at All Faiths.

Now in their 80's, Gerald and Janet admit that while life must slow down a bit, they continue to enjoy sports, Broadway shows, home and family. After seven years of lessons, they are accomplished ballroom dancers. Janet says "We are not 'Dancing with Stars' level but better than most lounge dancers." And both continue to be social and political activists. "We understand how we got to where we are and are willing to try to help leave the world a better place -- as long as the body is willing. Show up; Stand up; Get up and do something!"

Rosalie Kuehn Member Since October 2018



Rosalie Kuehn was born in Southbridge, MA, lived a short while in Connecticut, but spent most of her adult life in Nashua, New Hampshire. After completing three years of college, she dropped her studies to get married and raise a family. After being divorced and while raising her two sons, she completed an Associate Degree in Marketing Management. However, she never lost her desire to

teach. So, at age 40, she returned to college and two years later, earned a degree in Computer Science and Math from Rivier College... and was valedictorian of her class!

For 23 years, Rosalie was employed at Pinkerton Academy, a private/public school where Robert Frost had once taught. She taught math to sophomores and juniors (geometry and algebra II) as well as Consumer Math to high school students. Not content with a Bachelor's degree, Rosalie continued her studies and earned her Master's Degree in Math Education... at age 60!


She found the Fort Myers area through a teaching colleague who invited Rosalie to visit her in Florida. Rosalie was impressed by the community and in 2012, moved into that same development (Six Lakes Country Club). She is an active member of Six Lakes: she is a member of the

tennis team, plays in a golf league, serves as librarian for the community, helps maintain the Memorial Garden, and plays cards and Mah Jongg. In addition, she kayaks and tutors high school juniors... in math subjects, of course.

Rosalie, who was a lapsed Catholic, found kindred souls there and was active in that congregation until she made Florida her permanent home.

She joined the Unitarian Universalist Church of Fort Myers when she first moved to Florida but, lucky for us, All Faiths is closer to her home. In October, 2018, Rosalie Kuehn committed to becoming part of the All Faiths Congregation. She enjoyed the warm welcome she received when she first started attending, and continues to enjoy the friendships she is developing as she gets involved at the church.

Despite being so involved within her community, Rosalie has volunteered on All Faiths' Building and Grounds Committee. Already she has undertaken a couple of paint jobs (look at the sheds behind the building) and she is slated to do more painting in the future. She likes helping with building tasks because she can more easily fit one-time/short term projects into her already-busy schedule.



Author Dottie Pacharis Visits All Faiths April 10, 2019



Author Dottie Pacharis will lead a program related to her book *Mind On the Run: A Bi-Polar Chronicle* on April 10, 2019 at 1 pm at All Faiths Unitarian Congregation.

The book tells a compelling story of love and loss. It's a tragic account, filled with sadness and frustration, of a family's futile attempts to save their loved one. It takes readers inside the bipolar mind, a mind tormented by psychotic and delusional thoughts that erase any semblance of reality, a mind trapped in a body ravaged by irreversible damage from untreated bipolar disorder. Readers will grieve for Scott as they watch him lose his successful business, his family, and ultimately his life. Even as a broken mental health system protected Scott's civil right to remain mentally ill by refusing treatment, it rejected the fight by Scott and his family to obtain timely and humane treatment for him. When Scott was well, he tried to empower his family to help him during bipolar episodes, but the courts rejected his requests. His story shows us ways we can improve the system.
