

# **BOARD NOTES** by Chris Stotler, Board Chair

Your Board of Directors met September 15, 2021 via Zoom.

When we first announced the plan to re-open All Faiths to in-person services, we said it would be a fluid process driven by changing COVID conditions, scientific data, and other factors. In August, the Board reluctantly decided to once again go to only virtual services. Then at the September meeting, your Board voted to reopen services on a limited basis for up to 25 Members and Friends who have been vaccinated, wear masks, and observe social distancing protocols. Each week, Regina will conduct a lottery similar to the one previously used. Respond to Regina's weekly invitation if vou want to attend a service. We know some congregants are not comfortable attending in person while infection rates are so high in Florida. For others, the need to have the spiritual experience of being with

others for a service overrides the risks. The Board will continue to monitor the situation and make changes as needed.

We received news last week regarding the deck replacement which would cost around \$30,000. We will be investigating a lower cost option of installing steps that would lead down to a patio or garden-type sitting area. We have received gifts so far of \$2,000 and \$1,200 which can be used for additional deck costs if needed, or for other capital needs.

These gifts remind us that donations are critical to meeting needs of churches and other non-profit organizations. We are so grateful that Members and Friends often step up to meet special needs of our congregation. Some make significant gifts so they can see the near-term benefits; others include All Faiths in their wills, giving money to ensure All Faiths endures

as part of their legacy; some congregants do both. Gifts may be small or large; they all help. Please include All Faiths in your donations and your will and estate planning.

The Board hired a consultant to appraise our building replacement costs to ensure we were adequately covered by our insurance policy. We were pleased to learn that our current policy meets our needs; however, we will add a rider to cover the piano and the glass sculpture that hangs in the sanctuary.

We received the Final Reserve Study which was funded by a generous gift from one of our members. The study shows that our major capital replacement costs (such as HVAC replacement, roof repair, furniture replacement, etc.) over the next 25 years will be \$184,114. Thus, we need to set aside about \$13,800 every year to build a fund to cover those antici-

pated costs. To absorb this large budget increase, we are challenging those who have been participating in the "Burn the Mortgage" initiative to consolidate the amount they would contribute over the next two or three years into a one-time contribution this year. If we pay off the mortgage this year, we could re-direct the approximately \$20,000 that currently goes to our mortgage to the reserve fund and other needs.

# FROM McGregor Boulevard

Do you know a Pagan? You likely do and may not even know it. Many Unitarian Universalists draw inspiration from the cycles of seasons, the beauty and complexity of the natural world, and the intricate relationships between humans and all the other life on this planet. Some practice indigenous religions and Modern Paganism. All of these are part of the sixth source of our living tradition, "spiritual teachings of earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature."

There are a lot of myths and misconceptions about Paganism, mostly perpetuated by people who have yet to take the time to learn the truth. There are four major myths about Paganism that are simply not true: Pagans want to amass material wealth. - False. Pagans regard the emphasis on consumerism in the modern world to be evidence of spiritual poverty. Pagans engage in sexual debauchery. - False. The Pagan moral code is often stricter than that practiced in secular society. Pagans worship Satan. – False. The deities worshipped by pagans predate Christianity and the Christian Satan by thousands of years. Pagans practice black magic. – False. Pagans do not believe in the use of magic for ill intent, nor are they in favor of animal sacrifice.

We commit ourselves to the free and responsible search for truth and meaning. If we are to support those among us who identify as Pagans, we must become more competent in the understanding of Paganism, its rituals, its celebrations, its inspiration. You are offered many opportunities this month to do just that. We have scheduled Paganism 101 sessions, our Child and Youth Program will have lessons centered around Paganism, our October 31 service will have a Pagan theme, and you will have the opportunity to join in Pagan ritual scheduled throughout the month.

I hope you will commit to broadening your understanding of Paganism and how Paganism fits under our Unitarian Universalist umbrella. Our deeper understanding of one another will bring us closer.

# OCTOBER IS LGBTQ HISTORY MONTH

### **Background**

In 1994, Rodney Wilson, a Missouri high school teacher, believed a month should be dedicated to the celebration and teaching of gay and lesbian history, and gathered other teachers and community leaders who selected October because public schools are in session and existing traditions, such as Coming Out Day (October 11), occur that month.

Gay and Lesbian History Month was endorsed by GLAAD, the Human Rights Campaign, the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, the National Education Association and other national organizations. In 2006 Equality Forum assumed responsibility for providing content, promotion and resources for LGBT History Month.

### **Celebrate Our Heritage**

The LGBT community is the only community worldwide that is not taught its history at home, in public schools or in religious institutions. LGBT History Month provides role models, builds community and makes the civil rights statement about our extraordinary national and international contributions.

All Faiths has been organizing its support for Lee Interfaith for Empowerment (LIFE) which is starting its new year. Your three team leaders (Barb McFarlane, Lana Cowell, and Marsha Bates) hosted three house parties. During those on-line meetings, 26 congregants shared their concerns about issues impacting themselves, their families, and the community at large.

On October 5, LIFE will hold its Annual Assembly; due to the COVID situation, the meeting will be held virtually. At that gathering, network members will hear updates about the status of LIFE's ongoing initiatives (affordable housing and criminal justice/mental health) as well as learn which issues raised most frequently in the house parties held by the 19 LIFE congregations/synagogues that support LIFE's justice work. Network members will be given an opportunity to choose which specific issue LIFE will concentrate on in the upcoming year.

Some cities and states celebrate Indigenous Peoples Day instead of Columbus Day.

Since 1991, dozens of cities, several universities, and a growing number of states have adopted Indigenous Peoples' Day, a holiday that celebrates the history and contributions of Native Americans. Not by coincidence, the occasion usually falls on Columbus Day, the second Monday in October, or replaces the holiday entirely. As of 2020, the holiday is observed by the states of Minnesota, Alaska, Maine, Louisiana, Oregon, New Mexico, Nevada and Vermont, as well as South Dakota, which celebrates Native Americans' Day, and Hawaii, which celebrates Discoverers' Day.

Why replace Columbus Day with Indigenous Peoples' Day? Activists have long argued that holidays, statues, and other memorials to Columbus sanitize his actions—which include the enslavement of Native Americans—while giving him credit for "discovering" a place where people already lived.

"Columbus Day is not just a holiday, it represents the violent history of colonization in the Western hemisphere," says Leo Killsback, a professor of American Indian Studies at Arizona State University.

Columbus Day became a federal holiday in 1937, in part because of efforts by Roman Catholic Italian Americans. During the late 19th and early 20th century, members of the stigmatized ethnic and religious group successfully campaigned to establish a Columbus Day in order to place Catholic Italians, like Christopher Columbus, into American history. In doing so, they edged out people of Anglo-Saxon descent who wanted a federal holiday honoring Leif Erikson as the first European to reach the Americas.



# CLIMATE ACTION TEAM PARTICIPATES IN GLOBAL CLIMATE STRIKE

The Climate Action Team participated in the Global Climate Strike event that took place on September 24, 2021, world wide. These annual events were inspired by Greta Thunberg, the Swedish child activist who began a Friday strike from school to hold up signs about climate change outside the Swedish Parliament.

#### Comments:

Revenue/Operating Income decreased in August, compared to July. This is typical most years as congregants are traveling.

The outstanding mortgage principal at the end of July was \$71,522. This reflects significant progress because on April 1,2019 the mortgage principal balance was \$151,234! Special thanks to all the congregants who have made generous additional donations to "Burn the Mortgage"! In the last 12-month period, the mortgage balance decreased by \$28,217.

The Board of Directors has authorized a Capital Reserve Study to better understand our long-term costs/responsibilities for repairs to the church property (re-shingling the roof, repaving the parking lot, repainting, carpet replacement, etc.). The goal is to begin budgeting for these recurring expenses on a proactive basis, rather than scrambling to fund them on a case-by-case basis as the need approaches. If All Faiths is able to implement the funding of Capital Reserves, it could begin in the next fiscal year (2022-2023). This Reserve Study expense was subsidized.

In August, \$270 was collected for Angel Wings (Heart for Homeless Team) and in September, \$150 was collected for One Tree (Climate Action Team).
