

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors was held on Wednesday, September 19, 2018, at 3:45 p.m.

Cooler weather is coming. The wheel of the year keeps turning and we will soon be enjoying days with lower temperatures and longer nights in this paradise of Southwest Florida we call home.

At the board meeting in September we approved the Pet Policy and the Facility Use Agreement documents. These will provide clear guidance on these topics with a clear, consistent approach and process.

Rev. McGregor announced we now have a parish nurse for our congregation that will assist when congregants return home from hospitalizations, ensuring they have the medications and support they need to successfully resume home life. I hope that all members of the congregation feel the Board is serving the needs of the congregation in a way that is fair, efficient, kind, and in keeping with our principles. We are committed to serving to the best of our abilities and welcome comments and concerns. Please feel free to contact any Board member with positive feedback. And if you have less than positive feedback, also share that with us, but in the kindest way possible. Thanks.

This congregation is our spiritual family. As such we live, share, grow and challenge one another as in any family. It is good to remember we are a family of many individuals with different backgrounds and beliefs but with the commonality of principles we hold dear, especially inherent worth, justice

FROM McGregor Boulevard

In a few weeks, jack-o-lanterns will be lit, cobwebs will appear, lights will be strung from porches, and the streets of our neighborhoods will be abuzz with ghosts and goblins. I've done a fair amount of trick-or-treating myself and have plodded through leaves, up and down streets, up and down stairs, and through haunted houses with my own children. I know a few things about it.

I always wondered about the folks who would shut off their lights, draw the shades, close the curtains, and pretend they weren't home on the evening of Halloween. If that's you, don't worry. We still love you and you'll always have a home at All Faiths.

Even as a child, I wondered about the people behind the stockade who were refusing to join in the Halloween ritual of pushing tooth-decaying confections on strange and oddly dressed children pounding on their doors. What were they hiding from? Who were they avoiding? I appreciated those who would come half-way and place candy on the porch with a sign that read "TAKE ONE." Sheer hospitality. I took more than one...ok...I dumped the whole bowl into my bag and ran.

But not before taking revenge and consulting my arsenal of soap, toilet paper, and shaving foam—all influenced by my older brother. (I officially apologize to the good citizens of Potsdam, New York. You didn't deserve it.) Even though they were locked in their homes with their lights off, and the television on, mind you, they were willing to participate in trick-or-treating a little. And that's a start.

We don't just hide ourselves and avoid ghosts and goblins on Halloween. We can all claim some expertise in avoiding ghosts of our past and goblins in our present knocking on our emotional doors. We shut the lights off and lock the door a few hours before dusk so our avoidance is certain. Perhaps we dart for the light switch and door lock the second a strange and uninvited emotional knock is heard. Either way we are shutting out people, feelings, and experiences.

Facing these ghosts and goblins can be scary and difficult work. It's no wonder we hide. If we don't face and answer the dreaded knocks, we hinder our ability to build and maintain healthy relationships with others and

deny any chance of inner peace.

Of course it isn't realistic to leave all the lights on and the doors wide open. We are much too vulnerable for that. I wonder what would happen if we decided to come half way? What would happen if we mustered the courage to at least leave the television on and put the bowl out on the porch? It is certainly a risk. Sometimes we'll get hurt (or soaped).

The possibilities for liberation from suffering and the welcoming of forgiveness into our relationships and for us become real. Liberating oneself in such a way is surely a spiritual practice worth exploring.

May our ghosts and goblins no longer have the strength to haunt us. Let us leave the light on, be generous with our treats, and create inner peace for ourselves and risk becoming healthier and whole. Let us participate a little. It's a start.

TOGETHER ON THE JOURNEY

Each month the newsletter will profile an All Faiths' veteran and/or new member. This month we feature Diane Hand and Jose Vilas, and Darwin and Jean Haney.

Diane Hand and Jose Vilas Members Since May 2018



Diane Hand and her partner Jose Vilas are relative newcomers to Florida. Diane had been attending a Unity congregation in Bonita Springs but was seeking a congregation that had a greater focus on social justice. Driving by All Faiths, the couple noticed our rainbow

flag and decided that a congregation that publicly displayed support for gay rights was worth investigating. They visited All Faiths in January and were welcomed into membership in May.

They bring to All Faiths a rich international heritage. Diane's American father served in WWII and met his German wife in the Philippines. Diane's mother was a chemist who had been sent to the Philippines to develop a type of perfume. After marrying, her parents moved to San Francisco but returned to the Philippines when her father took an executive position with an international conglomerate. Diane was raised and attended primary and secondary schools there.

Jose was born and raised in Portugal. He describes his family as poor and the living as rough under the strong dictatorship cultures of Salazar, Tito, Franco and Mussolini. At 16, Jose left Portugal on a student visa to finish high school with an uncle who had emigrated to Connecticut.

Plans for further education were interrupted when he received two draft notices. The first came from Portugal, which was involved in a colonialist conflict in Africa. Jose ignored this notice and went to South Carolina with his then girlfriend who was attending school on a scholarship. He got a job there to help support her and they later married.

The second draft notice came from U.S. President Lyndon Johnson. Although Jose was strongly opposed to the Vietnam war, he enrolled for a three-year period and was sent to signal school and then to Germany. Following his discharge, he applied for U.S. citizenship and took a job as a translator for immigration services.

When Jose's marriage ended, he moved to Los Angeles where he felt he had found "Mecca' and immediately embraced what he describes as the free-wheeling 60's. Working miscellaneous jobs, he immersed himself in the drinking and drug culture for 15 years. Along the way, he began to realize he was becoming physically and mentally disabled.

He sought help and says that he was fortunate that the Veteran's Service sent him to an inpatient rehab center where he remained six months. Discharged with a new perspective on life, Jose sought out isolated jobs in Yosemite and Yellowstone National Parks where he concentrated on coping with his new sober reality.

Following high school graduation, Diane earned a degree in journalism and public relations from San Jose State in California. She first worked for a weekly newspaper in South Carolina, then married and followed her husband to Virginia where he was finishing his degree. There, she worked in public relations for Virginia Tech. The couple later moved to Washington, D.C. where she became the food editor for a military magazine for families of servicemen.

Diane and her ex-husband had no children. Her marriage ended after 15 years, and she moved to the Midwest, working for public relations firms in Minnesota and Kansas. She says she found Minneapolis a wonderful city, even the cold winters. She eventually returned to California to take a position as executive assistant to the president of Menlo College.

There, in 1989, she met Jose, with whom she discovered she had much in common. Diane and Jose both considered themselves rebels and refugees from the 60s. When they met, Jose was amazed that Diane lived in her van that was parked on campus! They both retired at about the same time – in 2011.

Diane's parents were both deceased, and since Jose's mother was living in Miami's South Beach they decided to try Florida. Miami, where they first lived, was too crowded for them, so they decided to explore the Gulf Coast, looking at Naples and then Fort Myers. This was during the economic downturn, and they decided to invest in five houses in the Bonita Springs area. It turned out to be a good investment, and Jose kept busy upgrading the houses. They have since sold all but one and have moved to a townhouse in Parkview off Summerlin in Fort Myers.

They enjoy traveling and have returned to Portugal and have visited Cuba.

When asked about their goals for their membership at All Faiths, Jose admits he is not a "church person." "I am basically an atheist," he said. "The last time I went to church I was 17!" However, he is pleased to attend services at All Faiths and is interested in our social justice activities.

Diane has some UU history. She attended a UU Sunday School and also learned Catholic doctrine from a priest who was a family friend. She admits that her Catholic father and Unitarian mother used to fight over religion. As a sort of compromise, she at one time attended an Episcopal church.

But for the past 30 years she has been a part of various Unity congregations. Now Diane and Jose rarely miss a Sunday service at All Faiths and have attended many of its activities.

Darwin and Jean Hany Members Since May 2018



Retired since 1992, Darwin and Jean Hany moved to Fort Myers four years ago after visiting a cousin here. They purchased a home in Seven Lakes after deciding Florida was a better place than Arkansas for their family to visit. Darwin and Jean had visited All Faiths periodically over the past four years. They

said they tried other UU congregations in the area and found the sermons and activities at All Faiths more in keeping with their former Unitarian congregation. They were welcomed as members at All Faiths last May.

Both Darwin and Jean lived most of their lives in Illinois. Jean was born and raised in Rockford. Her father was an immigrant from Sweden and her Scottish-Irish mother was from North Dakota. While her family was basically non-churched, Jean gained her first exposure to Unitarianism through her older sister, who had joined a high school UU youth group. When Jean reached high school, she also joined. Jean recalls a highlight of those years was attending a national UU youth convention.

Darwin was born on a farm in central Illinois and the family attended a Lutheran congregation. The family later moved to Gridley, Illinois (population 900). After moving to town, the family joined a Methodist congregation. Darwin reports that his decision to enter Bloomington Normal (later Illinois State College) following high school graduation was influenced by the wide availability of scholarships for students pursuing a teaching career.

Jean and Darwin met at college, and both earned B.S. degrees in education. Darwin graduated a year before Jean and,

after receiving his draft notice, enrolled in Naval Officer's Candidate School. Six months later he had earned his naval commission. Before Darwin was deployed to his first assignment in Guam, Jean and Darwin were married at the UU Church in Rockford.

Jean joined Darwin after she finished earning her degree. She taught high school math at a local school in Guam that also served children from the base. Jean chuckled that life went well for them. "We were 8,000 miles from the in-laws and lived in a three bedroom Quonset hut." Their first child was born on Guam.

Darwin began his military career as a line officer and ended up in military communications. His assignments took him from Guam to Seattle, and Pasadena. Jean became a stay-athome mother for her growing family of four children.

Following separation from the service, the family returned to Bloomington, Illinois, and Darwin took a position with State Farm Insurance. After 39 years, he retired from his position as Director of Loss Reserves. When their four children were grown, Jean worked for ten years for H&R Block. Until retirement, they attended the Bloomington UU congregation.

After retirement the Hanys moved to what was then the country's largest gated retirement community, Hot Springs Village in Arkansas. There they became active tennis players. Darwin says his team won 42 out of 45 matches during a tournament. No longer active tennis players, they currently enjoy golf, bridge, and bocce ball.

While at Hot Springs Village, the Hanys were founders of a UU congregation there. Members shared the pulpit with a retired UU minister. Both Jean and Darwin took active leadership responsibilities and Darwin served as program chair. By the time they left for Florida the congregation had grown from 25 to over 100 members. Now settled at All Faiths, they look forward to resting from leadership responsibilities and enjoy attending services as their main focus.
